SPOTLIGHT ON...

The Sears National Quilt Competition of 1933 by Sue Cameron

(Part 1 of a tale of intrigue & controversy)

ollowing on from Moira Ryder's fabulous discussion at our last KZNQG meeting, in which she spoke about depression era quilts, I thought it may be interesting to add a little further information that is relevant to that period in American Quilt History.



1933 Century of Progress Quilt in the Dwyer Collection

In January 1933, America was in the midst of the Great Depression. Banks were closing, businesses were going under and jobs were few and far between. The American public was really struggling to make ends meet. A new president had been elected but was only to be inaugurated in March. A new Ford motor vehicle cost \$500 and a new house \$3000.

Then, on the inside front cover of the Sears, Roebuck and Co. January catalogue, was the glimmer of hope for the nation - the headline "Do You Quilt?" It was the notice of a quilt competition sponsored by Sears, Roebuck and Co. The prize money totaled

\$7,500. The overall winner would take home \$1000 and other prizes ranged from \$5 to \$300. The competition was open to quilters from all over the country. The best 30 quilts would be displayed at the Chicago World's Fair which was also known as the Century of Progress Exposition. Sears promised an additional \$200 if the winning quilt was a Century of Progress themed quilt. Only 2 of the best 30 were theme quilts and the winning quilt was not one of these so that prize money was never awarded.

The entry rules were quite simple. The quilt had to be made entirely by the person who entered the quilt and it could not have been exhibited before. Each quilt entered had to have an official competition entry tag stitched onto the front of the quilt.

Sears profited well from the contest. They sold

fabric, supplies and patterns. They offered quilting advice in their stores, exhibited quilts that had been entered in their stores and received lots of publicity.

It is doubtful that Sears anticipated the enormous response they received. There were an unbelievable

24,878 quilts received nationwide making this the biggest quilt competition of all time! To manage the enormous number of quilts, judging had to happen on several levels. Quilts were judged at a local store, then at the regional level and then finally in the competition at the exposition.

The exhibition was held from May 1933 until November 1933. The Chicago World's Fair was then extended for the summer of 1934, although, sadly, the quilt exhibition had already been taken down. There were no photographs taken of the original quilt display in 1933. There was another exhibition presented in 1934 which displayed most of the regional winners and a selection of the Century of Progress theme quilts. There were just a few black and white photographs taken of this exhibition.

About 5 million people passed through the exhibition, admiring the quilts as they went.

This competition was very controversial to say the least!!!

The biggest controversy was with regards to the winning

quilt! Margaret Rogers Caden of
Lexington, Kentucky entered her
quilt called Star of the Bluegrass.
The quilt was a lovely lone star quilt
made in shades of green. (It was
mostly Nile green or "that green"
that Moira spoke about at the last
meeting.) The plain areas in the
quilt were quilted in a trapunto
style. The workmanship in the quilt
was beautiful.

Margaret Rogers Caden was a wealthy business owner who

employed women to, amongst other things, make quilts for her. She signed a declaration on her quilt tag to say that she had made it, yet it was common knowledge in her part of the world that she had not stitched a single stitch in the quilt. The women who were responsible for making the quilt had not said anything as they did not want to lose their jobs. She kept all of the \$1000 the quilt won. She had, however, paid them each \$25 before the quilt was entered. She never acknowledged the women who made the quilt.

The quilt was presented to the new first lady, Eleanor Roosevelt in November 1933. The quilt has never been seen since and it is believed that Mrs. Roosevelt did not like the quilt and gave it away soon after receiving it. Margaret Rogers Caden was very unhappy that her quilt had been given away so she had a second identical one made which was later discovered in her attic.

She cared deeply about te children she taught, and we were fortunate to teach on the same staff at DPHS for several years, where she established the learning support programme for boys who joined us from disadvantaged backgrounds. Her patience and nurturing of these youngsters did much to contribute to their academic growth and confidence.

Beulah's hands were always busy: she loved her quilting projects, and gifted her beautiful quilts to family and friends across the globe. She passed her love of quilting on to me, and we would spend happy hours together sewing and pressing seams, discussing design and colour choices. When I felt overwhelmed by an unfinished project, she often did the finishing touches for me.

Beulah was practical and direct: she was solution-orientated. She made a difference in people's lives by giving her time, her care, her advice, her love. Throughout her brave and long walk with her illness, she never fixated on her own difficulties: she looked outward towards others, and was always fun to be around. Her bursts of laughter, her ready humour, her perseverance and her social nature connected people to her through even the most difficult times in her life. At all times



she felt comforted by her deep Christian faith.

Dear Beulah, your stitches of love will continue to bind all those who knew you to the wonderful memories you have left in our hearts. We have been privileged to have known you.

Each year they hang an exhibition for the Quilters in Pietermartizburg celebrating National Quilt Day. These exhibitions hang for 2-4 weeks in March each year. The museum staff have been amazing and taken care of all the hanging and exhibiting of our quilts, for which we have been most grateful.

I had a meeting at the Museum on Wednesday 20th July to discuss the exhibition in March 2017. As we all know National Quilt Day is in March and so is Human Rights day so for next year we would like to celebrate both these days at the same time. There will be many different organisations invited to the opening, and there will be many very interesting participants celebrating Human Rights Day.

What we would like from the Quilters is that you make a small A4 depicting one of the Human Rights these little quilts can be made using any techniques you like and finished off as is appropriate to your little quilt. These little quilts will then be sewn together either as they are or onto a background. This quilt will then be donated to the Museum. We will also have other quilts on the exhibition and will have Human Rights statements where appropriate on the quilts with the relevant statement next to it.

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Tricks of the Trade Tips and Advice for Quilters

Quilt Hanging Sleeves

his article is researched especially for all of you who are finishing off quilts for the 29 October Show.

This sleeve allows show organisers to hang your


Loose "flap" for drawing pins

Fixed sleeve for lathe.


Sleeve for hanging at shows.

* Hand stitch to backing.

quilt by putting pins through both layers of just the flap, thus avoiding pin holes in your quilt. It also provides a sleeve for a lathe or rod to hang



It is basically a tube of fabric (cut \pm 8") that is divided into two lengthwise by stitching it down between 1"and $\frac{3}{4}$ " from the top edge to create a flap. The sleeve is hand stitched to the back of the quilt with two horizontal seams (*) after the quilt has been completed. It can be made as one long sleeve or in two sections.



The other, more conventional sleeve is pictured below.

In this case the sleeve is sewn by machine onto the quilt in the same seam as the binding.

It is hand stitched to the backing leaving a loose 'bulge' to allow a rod or lathe to be inserted with-

out causing tension on the front of the quilt.


