Around the World of Quilts



Editor's note: Following a trip to Russia by two KZNQG quilters a few years ago, during which they met Ms Stepanova and saw her quilts, we asked Galina to tell us about her quilting journey. I hope you enjoy her story and unique work.

Quilter's profile: Galina Stepanova—Russia

I studied to be an electronic engineer, but I did not like my occupation. I wanted to sew, draw, embroider and knit. In the beginning I did these in my spare time.

I made my first quilt for my son in 1978. This was my first experience of quilting, I did not know the technique and rules and did not have any literature on patchwork, but the desire to sew was enormous. Fifteen years later I sewed a second baby and an adult quilt.

In the beginning of 2000 I saw patchwork blocks sewn by one of my friends. It was like an explosion!! I did not want to do anything else. At the same time, I visited a patchwork exhibition and my desire to sew still grew.

Bags

I found a teacher, took lessons and diligently sewed-up all the blocks. I continued to learn the technique until 2005. I really enjoyed the courses I attended, and now I sometimes go to workshops presented by of famous quilters.

I wrote my own program "Patchwork for the lazy and busy" and started teaching in 2006. In 2015, my first book by the same name was published. At the same time, I began to publish my articles on patchwork in the Russian patchwork magazine, and later in other magazines on needlework.



When I became a quilter, a huge world of creativity openedup for me, and it completely changed my way of life. Patchwork became a profession for me, a relaxation, a circle of communication.

In Russia, patchwork has become very popular in the past 10 years. In the past, patchwork was more a housewife's occupation, common in villages, not in the city. When I started sewing the first quilts, some of my friends asked: "Are you short of money?". They associated patchwork with poverty. And I'm very glad that this attitude to patchwork has now changed.

When I was still learning patchwork, the stitches turned out curvy. I did not have problems with the selection of fabrics and colors, but to sew accurately straight was an issue. I also do not like to iron. And so, my own style emerged: curved lines sewn onto a base and quilted.

My first quilts were traditional. I mostly sewed decorative pillows for sisters, friends and neighbors. I then began to sew small picture quilts. Much later, quilts became more abstract, in the form of art quilts. I like the different textures of fabric, different colors, often use linen and silk. I find linen a very pliable fabric and silk gives an overflowing and festive mood. Curved lines have become my favorite technique in patchwork., but when I sew blankets, of course, I use traditional patchwork.

I like to use furniture fabrics. In quilts I use fabric samples, which furniture workshops throw away, but for the quilter this is a wonderful material. Thanks to these fabrics, I created a series of quilts called "Seasons in a megacity".

For embellishment I used buttons. I also made co-

vers and rugs from them.

I have been teaching patchwork for more than 12 years. Most of all I like the beginners course. I like to change beginners' opinion: in patchwork sewing there is nothing complicated, the main thing is to move from simple to complex.

I also teach a patchwork bag course, which is fashionable and relevant. I design the patterns myself. I enjoy the bags because they are not flat, but have volume, form. I like to think through a pattern, adjust it, sew a layout. This is creativity.


In 2012 and 2016 my solo exhibitions were held in art galleries. Since 2006 I take part in the Russian guilt festivals. In 2006 I participated for the first time in a guilt competition of the Moscow re-

It is difficult for me to say what my quilts express, most likely my condition at the moment. Color corresponds to the mood of a person. If in a bad mood, I choose dark colors, if in good - choose light or bright. Once complete, I often name the quilt by the associations that it excites ("Life page"). When I participate in a quilt project and quilt on a given topic, I make sketches, drawings, sometimes patterns (Quilts "Bakhchisaray", "Seagulls"). But I like this way less.

As soon as I started patchwork, I abandoned knitting and embroidery for a long time. I begrudge spending any time on other activities, though I sometimes knit, but only for myself and it happens rarely. Although knitted products can be used in quilts, I really prefer using old fabric and clothes, give them a second life. This is important from an ecological perspective. I have devoted two chapters to this topic in my latest book, and if I write a third book, I believe it, too, will be devoted to this topic.

Since 2005, I am the chairlady of a quilt guild "Inflorescence". we meet twice a month, we show our new quilts, we analyze new techniques and sew group quilts and projects. We are currently working on the project "Russian sateen", using old Russian fabrics. This theme is very exciting and 19 quilts have already been sewn for the project.

SAQG COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT BACK By Martline Turner

On the weekend of 7-8 July the SAQG Committee meeting was held at the Cannons Creek School in Cape Town. Once again, the Reps were hosted by Renee de Beyer and Jenny Hermans. The catering was done by Renee and her son and we were treated to the most delicious meals. Pine Needles Guild did the teas for both days.

We had a very long and comprehensive Agenda with lots to discuss and decide upon.

<u>HALL OF FAME</u> One of the most exciting items on the Agenda is the Hall of Fame. This is where we will honour our Quilters, Teachers and Vendors. In the Hall of Fame we will showcase the work of a Quilter/s or the contribution a vendor/s has made to quilting. Anyone can be nominated for this honour. I will give you more information once available. There will be nomination forms for each category. Watch this space—it is very exciting!

<u>WEBSITE</u> The website is up and running. Jenny asked that guilds send her any info that they would like to be put onto the website to keep it updated and fresh.

<u>FESTIVAL 2019</u> Sandra de Wet gave us a Festival update. The Festival theme is INTERCHANGE THREADS CONNECT. Sandra recommended that future festivals stick to just one strap line: they have Interchange-Threads connect" just one is more workable.

<u>VENUE</u> The committee have been very busy organising and fundraising. They are so very excited with the venue that they have secured Hebronbridge -a private school with all the amenities that a Festival like this requires.

The website is up and running, with a pleasing contemporary look and feel, and the ease of navigation. The online application from teachers, retailers and sponsors have gone smoothly.

<u>COMPETITION</u> The Competition Categories are advertised on the Website. With regards the exhibition brochures, as we all know, it is very expensive to print these, so there will no longer be a brochure printed. Also, so many visitors use their cell phones to photograph the quilts. The CD that has been made in the past will be replaced with a USB stick.

The Committee would like to encourage Quilters to enter quilts, and this year the entry fee has been lowered to R150 per quilt. There will also be a Lucky Draw prize for group entries, to encourage those who are too nervous to enter on their own.

<u>CHALLENGES</u> There will be two challenges, the Local Challenge, already advertised, focused on the theme "Threads Connect".

The committee are also working on an International Challenge, a tri-nations one similar to that at the 2008 festival, that was so successful. This challenge will focus on the "Interchange" part of the logo. Erla Cilliers has been working with two European guilds, who will hopefully participate in this challenge. These quilts will be judged independently of the main competition. Master Quilters are not eligible to enter this part of the competition, thus as a result, the Committee is hoping to encourage newer quilters to enter.

<u>TEACHERS.</u> There was a good response from South African teachers eager to offer classes. Combined with the overseas contingent, there will be 89 workshops available with lectures every day.

So all in all this is a Festival to look forward to.

About SAQG

The South African Quilters' Guild is the National Guild of South Africa. It is a non-profit association with 11 Regional Guilds represented and other quilting groups that are affiliated to the SAQG.

So the SAQG is the umbrella guild of the regional guilds. Membership of SAQG is automatic for paid up members of the regional guilds, individuals and Country Groups who are affiliated to the Guild.

MISSION STATEMENT: To foster an environment in South Africa where all people interested can reach their full potential in quilt-making, nationally and internationally.

The aim of the national guild is to be a resource of information and to support regional guilds and groups in their activities to further the objectives of their guilds.

We aim to

- Promote quilting and quilt-makers nationally and internationally.
- Establish basic rules and regulations as well as categories for National Quilt Competitions.
- Be present at the National Quilt Festivals organized by the regional Guilds.
- Support the Guilds by:
 - promoting the art of quilt-making in all South African communities
 - educating the quilter and the public about quilts and quilt-making
 - encouraging high standards of design and workmanship in quilting

In 11 geographical areas in South Africa regional guilds have been established since the mid 1980's. **Each Regional guild** is run by a committee and they have paid—up members, hold meetings, run projects and events that strive to meet the needs of their members.

Each regional Guild chooses a person to **represent** their guild and to serve on the SAQG committee. **The SAQG Representatives** are the links between guilds, keeping their members informed and up to date with quilt related matters in the country.

The SAQG Representatives take on their responsibilities and handle portfolios to meet the objectives of the Guild and do their job and duties voluntarily.

SAQG strives to meet the following Objectives

- To promote Quilting in all SA communities.
- To set guidelines for the National Quilt Festivals organized and hosted by the 4 main Regional Guilds in South Africa.
- To ensure competent and fair judging at SA National Quilt Competitions by:
 - Setting the Rules and regulations of categories for National guilt competitions
 - Conducting Quilt Judge Accreditation Course as required
 - Maintaining a list of SAQG Accredited Judges
 - Maintaining a list of judging events and evaluations
 - Co-ordinating the SAQG Judges' Forum

- To organise Exhibitions from time to time e.g. the Biennial Travelling Exhibitions.
- To maintain a SAQG website that is a reference website that provides information about regional and country guilds, teachers and judges and many other aspects of quilting in Southern Africa.
- To encourage guilds and groups to participate in community, outreach and charity projects and to showcase their involvement on the SAQG website.
- To encourage individuals, groups and guilds to engage with youngsters, showing and telling them about quilts and quilting and how to quilt by offering projects, workshops that teach basic sewing and more advanced skills and set competitions, to grow the future quilters.
- To encourage the celebration of the International/ National Quilt Day on the third Saturday in March each year.
- To maintain records of Heritage Quilts in Southern Africa and add information as necessary.
- To maintain a history of Quilt-making in South Africa.
 - * To chronicle the Final Reports of all National Festivals.
 - To keep a Register of Prize winning quilts at National Quilt Festivals.
 - * To have a Quilters' Hall of Fame on the website that honours quilting personalities.
- To compile and maintain a National Quilt Teachers' Register.
 - To run Quilt Teacher Accreditation courses as required.
 - * To establish and have a Teachers' Forum where matters are discussed and a regular newsletter is sent to Teachers' Forum members
- To compile and maintain SAQG Membership lists.
- To compile and maintain a SAQG Directory with information and contact details of guilds, groups, shops all over the country.
- To send to all members by email a regular SAQG Newsletter.
- To bring together annually, the Representatives of Regional Guilds in order to carry out the above functions.

Membership of SAQG - Affiliated guilds and groups give the SAQG an amount of R10 per person on their membership list per annum as a contribution to further the aims and objectives of the SAQG. This relatively small payment entitles the members to automatic SAQG membership and goes a long way to supporting the goals of the National Guild. Individuals can join for R50pp per annum.

We currently have 2006 members.

Funds in the SAQG are used to maintain the website and running costs of the guild. Funds are used to donate the cash prizes for Best on Show quilts at the biannual NQF and towards many of the projects, programs or courses that further the aims of the Guild.

I hope the above give you an idea of what SAQG has done over the past 29 years and what role your Guild Representative plays in keeping the Guild going, and passing on information and in furthering interest in the quilting community. Note that the Hall of Fame and Directory are being established.

R10 paid per person by your guild to SAQG is a meagre amount over 12 months! It is the price of a bottle of water or chocolate.

Border Patrol!

Borders. How can 7 little letters give us so many problems? Borders that are too long mean you get waves and "Dog ear" corners. Borders that are too short mean the centre of your quilt puffs up and borders around blocks (sashings) cause exactly the same issues. We have ALL been there at some time or another but fortunately, the solution is simple! When I started quilting I used to just cut a strip of fabric and sew it on starting at one end. I soon found out that I didn't get the result I wanted!

Once you have finished your quilt top, it SHOULD lie nicely flat when laid out on a table or clean floor, but we all know that 's not always the case! The problem generally starts with sashings on blocks and blocks that are not all squared up to the same size from the beginning. By the time you have put all these together and multiplied a few millimetres difference over 10 or 12 blocks, you can have quite a challenge on your hands! Then you add borders and boy oh boy what have we got here!





Measure your quilt horizontally through the centre and again about 1/3 of the way from each end. Don't measure on the edges of the quilt as these can easily stretch. Ideally each of these measurements should be the same but that is rarely the case! A difference of about ½ inch can be worked in without too much problem. If you have a bigger variance than that, then you will have to go back and see where your extra fabric has crept in! In my example here, (I'm

using a block rather than a whole quilt) the top, bottom and middle measurements are 12.5 inches. A perfect block! How lovely!



Cut your border strips to the desired width and length. If at all possible cut them down the length of your fabric rather than across the width. This way you will have much less stretch to your strips which will mean you are less likely to sew in extra fabric. However, cutting across the width is also fine but you need to be more aware of the stretch. Cut 2 strips to the width of your quilt (12.5 inches in my case). Fold the strip in half and then half again and mark those centres (you will have 3 markers).





Fold your quilt top edge in half and half again marking these centres.

Match the markers on your quilt to the markers on your border strip and pin. Then pin the rest of the length, easing in any additional fabric or stretching slightly to get the 2 pieces to fit. Doing

this will allow any extra fullness to be spread along the length of the border and not all be squeezed in at the end.

I'm going to share with you the method to add your sashings and borders so that your quilt tops will be nice and flat, square and lovely to quilt. It all comes down to measuring. Yes, I know; what a pain! But it really is the key. So get out your tape measures and here we go!

Sew your ¼ inch seam removing the pins as you go and then carefully press. Repeat for the bottom edge of your quilt. Ok, you now you have the top and bottom borders attached. Next you need to turn the quilt and re-





peat the process for the side borders measure through the centre, cut strips, fold to find centres, pin and sew. If you follow this process you will definitely have a quilt top that is square and lies flat. That translates into a top that is simpler (and more fun) to quilt!!

While we are on the subject of measuring: how many of you measure your binding when you attach it? Have you ever

made a quilt that had a wavy edge when you'd finished it? Bindings are just like any other border - if you don't measure it, you're asking for trouble. Ask me, I know from personal experience! Most of my quilts are relatively small and I'd not had a problem until I put the binding on one of my show quilts called African Fusion.



My perfectly flat quilt ended up with a lettuce leaf edge! I phoned my friend Ina for advice. "Did you measure it?" She asked. Did I what?!!! So I ended up taking the binding off and starting again. By measuring it, I removed 7 inches of fabric, yes, 18 cm of additional binding fabric that I'd managed to sew in the first time round. No wonder it wouldn't lie flat! It happens to all of us! You are not alone but at least you should now be on the right track to making your quilting so much simpler! I know I took a picture of the offending binding and resulting lettuce leaf but for some unknown reason I must have deleted it so can't share it here. But I did at least tell you about my experience!
