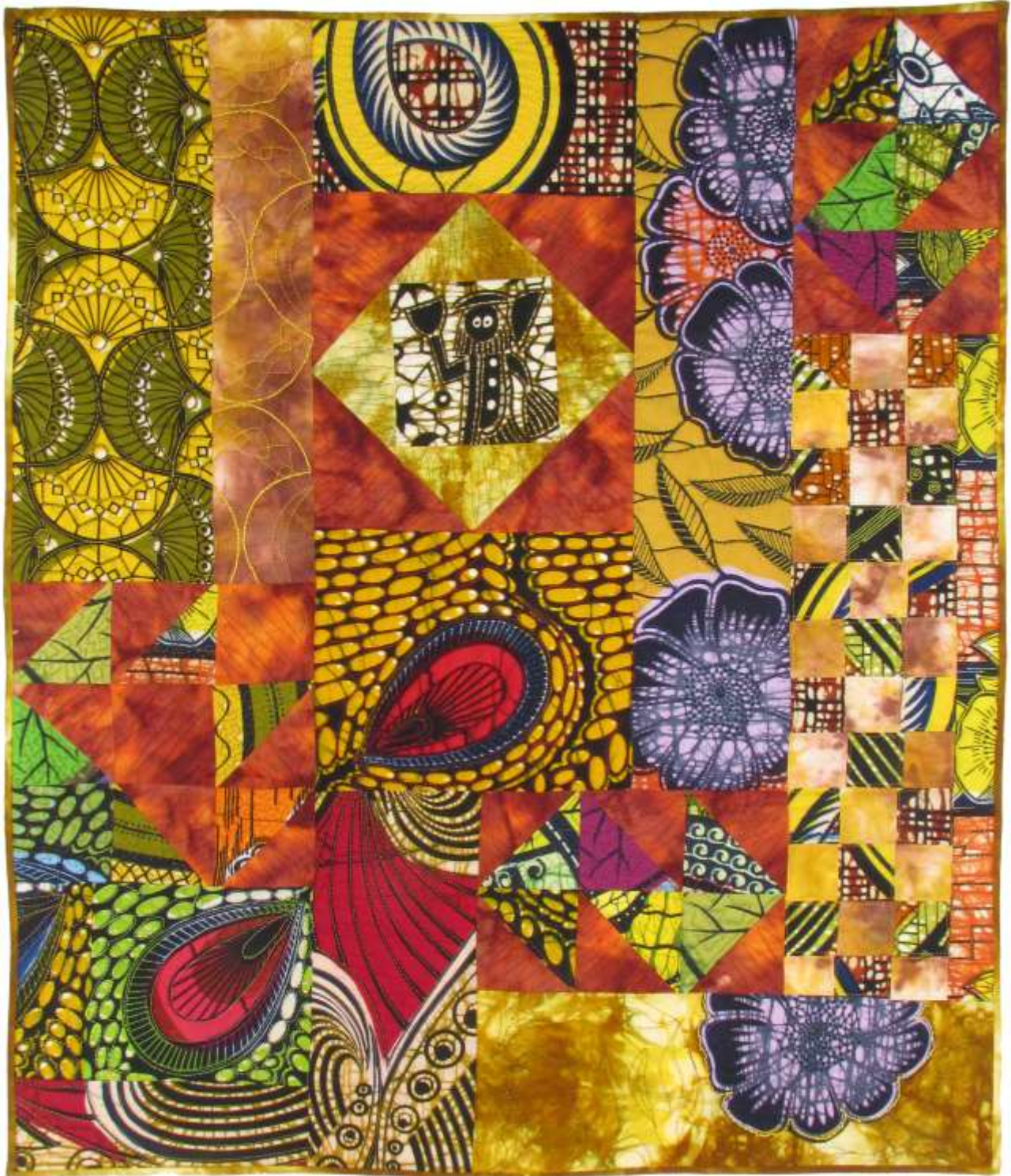

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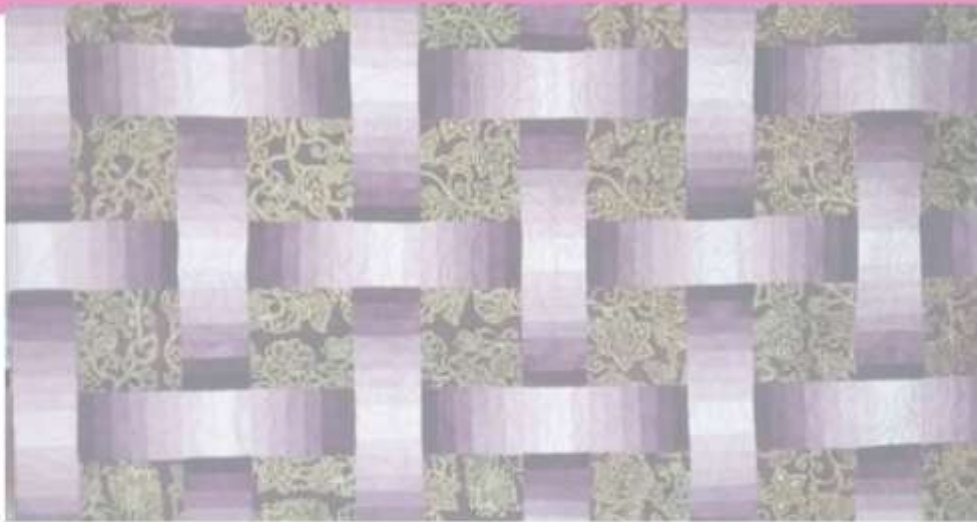

Around the World of Quilts

Editor's note: I came across some of the photographs included in this article while researching African quilts on Pinterest. The quilts were featured on the Quiltfest website—showcasing [Quiltfest 2012—Magie Relph—A Bucketful of Fabric](http://www.quiltfest.org.uk/magie-relph-2012.html) (<http://www.quiltfest.org.uk/magie-relph-2012.html>).

The featured quilts told the story of *The African Fabric Shop*. I was curious to find out more, and was so taken with the imagination, beauty and artistry of the quilts, that I made contact with the Quiltfest organisers who, in turn, put me in contact with the owners of The African Fabric Shop. Patchwork using African was print fabric, in 4 colour-ways, cut up and re-assembled.

Magie Relph's passion for African textiles, heritage and design began in the 1980s, while she spent time travelling and working all over Africa.

She made her first patchwork quilt on the road, collecting scraps of African fabrics as she travelled. She sewed them together into patchwork to kill the time at border posts.

Bob Irwin got hooked on Africa as a ten year-old. His teacher Mr. Wilson - who was born in Angola and taught for years in Nigeria - gave him an African porcupine quill. It took twenty years of dreaming, but he eventually ended up working with Magie.

After getting married in Nairobi, they gravitated back to the UK. Magie continued to develop creatively as a textile artist and quilter. Bob became a technical author in an exciting new sector called 'the internet'.

Magie did talks and workshops for patchwork, embroidery and textile groups, while Bob built the first African Fabric Shop website. Soon, they were back on the African road researching, documenting and buying even more African fabrics!

'And where did they store this stash of fabrics,' you might wonder? In their modest three bedroom house in West Yorkshire. As they bought more fabrics, beads, and baskets - the ratio of shop to home space tipped way beyond the balancing point.

The solution came out of the blue when their local postmaster and good friend James moved on and left the village post office vacant. As an experiment, they moved in and it worked!

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Quilt of Belonging is a 120 foot (36m)-long collaborative textile art project.

Its 263 blocks portray the rich cultural legacies of all the First Peoples in Canada and every nation of the world at the dawn of the new Millennium.

Quilt of Belonging's mission is to recognise Canada's diversity, celebrate it's common humanity and promote harmony and compassion among people.

The project was born in 1998 after artist Esther Bryan's life-changing journey to her ancestral country—Slovakia. The trip helped her recognise that each culture has a unique beauty, and that the experiences and values of our past influence who we are today.

In this textile mosaic, each person can experience a sense of belonging and find a place in the overall design - there is "A Place for All". Together they record human history in textile, illustrating the beauty, complexity and sheer size of the human story.

This monumental artwork, Canada's most comprehensive textile art project, is the work of volunteers. From across Canada, participants were invited to contribute their talents and ideas, reflected through the prism of their cultural backgrounds. The range of materials is astonishing, from sealskin to African mud-cloth, from embroidered silk to gossamer wings of butterflies.

The inaugural exhibition of the completed Quilt of Belonging took place April 1st, 2005 at the Canadian Museum of Civilization in Gatineau (Ottawa).

Already 1.4 million visitors have seen the Quilt, experiencing its message of inclusion and richness in diversity.

We continue to work diligently and enthusiastically on our goodie bag contributions!

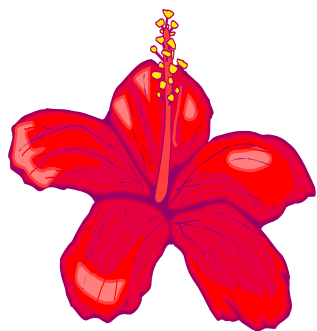
Our October meeting celebrates quilting and friendship and we look forward to each of our members bringing a friend to see how much fun quilting could be!

At our July meeting, we had a series of demos. Marline Turner showed us how to do successful continuous binding. This method is now my new best friend, as far as binding goes.

Pauline Law showed us how to measure for borders and binding, to eliminate wavy borders and bindings.

Judy Fennemore showed us the easy way to use a wedge ruler, called stack and whack. what an eye opener. And so easy if you have this ruler.

Colleen Roberts taught us how to do a new style sleeve. It is the way to go in the future and saves your quilt from all those pins when it's hung.

August saw Drene Ruddy talking about English Paper Piecing and long arm quilting. Each of the 3 buddy group leaders also did an entertaining short talk.

September saw Al Kirkiridis talking about "Amafu - a trip down memory lane". We all have memories of Glenda and the kind, generous, talented person that she was.

Artroots is still going strong - soon we will be going to the gallery where the Fibreworks exhibition is on. These are works by all of our local Fibreworks artists.

We have found that the tea duty ladies spend a lot of time in the kitchen after tea, doing the washing up, and usually miss the start of the talk. So we have adopted the "bring your own mug" system. It is working well.
