

In Bev's words:

As a young girl, growing up with Barbie dolls, I learnt to cut and sew clothes on a vintage hand Singer sewing machine.

During my teenage years I made all my school uniforms and clothes, to stretch my allowance!

My first patchwork quilt was made after I finished university and had my own apartment. It had no quilting, as batting was not available where I live. Slowly my repertoire of skills increased with the inception of the Harare Patchwork and Quilting Guild in 1986.

Initially my love was for hand applique, English Paper Piecing and hand quilting. As the number of quilt tops increased, I realised I needed to improve my machine quilting. In 2008 I won a Bernina, with a BSR attachment, in Canada, which changed my quilting style. I moved away from traditional patterns and started designing my own patterns, printing photos on cloth and thread painting.

Now I strive to make a mark in the quilting world, using African fabrics and depicting African scenes, using techniques I have adapted to suit my style.



From Durban

Take the N3 towards Pietermaritzburg. Go through the Marianhill Toll Plaza.

Take the Shongweni off ramp which is the first one after the Toll.

At the top of the ramp, turn right. This will take you over the N3 and M13 freeways.

** Continue along this road (Kassier Road) until you get to a set of traffic lights at a T-Junction.

(It is a few kilometers. You will pass the Polo Pony Petrol Station, the Mushroom Farm, the Hillcrest Busamed Hospital and a fair number of nurseries.)

At the T-junction, turn right into Old Main Road in Hillcrest.

Go up the hill and you will see the church on your left.







No judging by quilt judges will take place because it's a festival year, however the viewers will be the judges! Fantastic Prizes will be awarded so don't miss out!!!!

We will have **two categories** this year:

Viewer's choice: Best Quilt on Show Viewer's Choice: Best Challenge Quilt

Criteria to meet for the Best Quilt on Show:

Bed and Group Quilts: Minimum size: 130 cm Maximum Size: 240 cm

Wall Quilt: Minimum size: 30cm Maximum Size: 200 cm Any category will be welcomed. (Quilting Rules apply)

Entrance Fee: R 100

Criteria for the Challenge Quilt:

Size: A3 ONLY

Theme: Your interpretation of a Rainbow

Fabric: Use your own stash

Entrance Fee: R 100

End Use: Festival Fund Raiser. You will need to donate your A3 Rainbow Quilt.

THE WORLD QUILT COMPETITION IS SUSPENDED INDEFINITELY

The World Quilt Competition in the USA started in 1996 and was the brainchild of brothers Peter & David Mancuso (Mancuso Show Management). Since 2001 South Africa has taken part in the annual World Quilt Competition and Odette Tolksdorf has been the South African coordinator from the beginning. Odette taught and judged at the World Quilt and Textile Show a number of years, and she curated special exhibitions of South African quilts for those shows.

This competition was a wonderful opportunity for South Africans to exhibit and compete their quilts abroad.

Each year a Best of Country prize is awarded – in this SA quilts are competing against other SA quilts. However there were also prizes given where the quilts competed against all other countries in the competition. SA quilts won 20 of these prizes thru the years, including Best Use of Colour 5 times, three First Prizes, and Best Hand workmanship and Best Machine workmanship (2 quilts)

The number of entries from South Africa each year was 12 on average—one year even had 24 entries.

At the end of 2021 the World Quilt Competition was suspended indefinitely.

Message from Odette:

I have been the South African co-ordinator of the annual World Quilt Competition in the USA since 2001. Over the past 20 years it has been a privilege and a joy for me to see some of the best quilts in South Africa, and to organise the shipping for them to be exhibited in the USA and returned home again.

Thank-you to all who participated in the World Quilt Competition over the years by entering your quilts to proudly represent South Africa in the international quilting arena.

We would like to thank Odette Tolksdorf for being the South African co-ordinator of the World Quilt Competition for 20 years!

When I heard my quilt was accepted into the WQC I was overjoyed, and even asked my cousin in the US to "visit" my quilt when the exhibition was nearby. Heady days indeed. It gave me a huge boost to my confidence—so a personal thank you to Odette! - Ed




Talk shows/Lectures:

So off I went to the Izotsha weekend down the South Coast with no huge expectations except to see (and buy!) lots of fabric and piles of inspiration. And right at the back of the exhibition hall I found my Cutie.

Debbie from Bernina Durban North had the Grace Company's Cutie frame on display, and it definitely got my attention. I played around on the quilt Debbie provided, and a new experience opened up for me - no more sore hands and scrunched-up shoulders.

This particular set-up enabled me to practice and use the skill of free motion quilting (FMQ) while standing up and without the need to lean over to the machine (this being a huge advantage for me due to a back injury), and did not require the intense use of hands and fingers in the holding and moving around of the quilt sandwich, thus helping with my arthritis.

The frame is affordable, does not require more than a dining-room size table top of space, and best of all - is suitable for all domestic machines on which feed dogs can be dropped.

Depending on your machine's throat space, you get between 5 and 15 inches of quilting space. In my case, I have an Elna eXcellence 730, which allows me 6 - 8 inches of quilting space top to bottom and about 60 inches across (left to right) This is more than adequate for the size quilts I usually make.

It was a happy day when I finally got my Cutie home and my husband set it up for me.

I spent the next month carefully researching FMQ on a (small) frame, the various motifs which one can use (there's an endless list of these, from easy to difficult).

I did a free online course on how to plan which motifs go where on your quilt - it was extremely informative and provided a different perspective, as I have never thought to plan - my focus was always how to fit the huge quilt in my machine's limited throat space and not get puckers in the quilt. (For more information on the course, check out www.stringandstory.com and for "string and story" on YouTube - where you can find plenty of free blogs and videos).

After practicing the various motifs I came across online and in also looking at magazines for 3-4 weeks, I carefully drew an outline for a Round Robin quilt I wish to practice on, and within the outline I drew up my FMQ motif plan. I practiced each motif, to ensure I had a good understanding on how to keep the quilting continuous, moving from area to area and from motif to motif.

So - happy days are here - I am hoping to get some time this weekend to load my quilt onto the frame and get going.

SUE PRINS 31/07/1946—12/02/2022

What a very sad loss to Quilting in South Africa.

FAMILY

Sue met her husband Frans Prins when he was working in America. As a very young lady Sue followed Frans back to South Africa and they were married in 1967. Sue and Frans live in Hermanus. They have three daughters, Jacqui who lives in the USA, Judy who was living in Hermanus until they immigrated to Holland last year.



Their youngest daughter Nicky lives in Cape Town. I know that all the grandchildren are such a blessing to Frans and Sue, they were so proud of each one of them.

AWARDS

Sue is a Master Quilter and is well known for her beautiful quilts. "Hex Folly" - which won many awards here in South Africa - was also chosen to tour to many exhibitions. Her quilt "Celtic Wedding Ring" also a

prizewinning quilt, won Best of Country in the World Quilt Competition. At the Interchange Festival in 2019 Sue's very beautiful quilt, "Victoria" won First Prize.

SOUTH AFRICAN QUILTERS' GUILD COMMITTEE

Sue served on this committee for many years in various portfolios where she represented her regional guild as well as establishing portfolios within the national guild and was the most capable President from 2015 to 2017

PRO-DEDICATE AWARD

On 18/08/2015 Sue was presented with the prestigious SAQG Pro Dedicate award for her outstanding service and recognition of her dedication to the promotion of Quilting in South African as well as for her passion, leadership and vision in all she did for SAQG.

NATIONAL QUILT FESTIVALS

She served with great dedication and knowledge on the committee of three National Quilt Festivals.

JUDGING.

Sue was an accredited quilt judge, and was the organiser and involved in the tutoring of the judging candidates since 2004.

TEACHER ACCREDITATION COURSE

Sue was also the person who saw the need for a Teacher Accreditation course which she helped design and co-ordinated until she handed the responsibility over to Jenny Hermans and continued to Tutor until her passing.



TEACHING

Sue first teaching experience was in 1977, with teaching local domestic workers. She then graduated to teaching larger groups of ladies and then taught throughout the country.

Her main objectives in teaching quilting were to transmit and strengthen good basic quiltmaking skills especially hand techniques, and to help students become aware of design principles to enable them to use these to create their own quilts. Also to encourage them to develop a passion for quality and well made quilts. Her students left the class with three things: a new improved skill, warm memories of the class and all that they gleaned from it and a heightened sense of self-worth.

Sue was the MOST competent quilt teacher and her attention to detail in all her works are a tribute to that.

A SPECIAL FRIEND

My friendship with Sue started in 1991 at the Safari Festival. What an amazing person and friend she has been over all these years

We served for many years on the SAQG Committee together. Over the years we were in the Judging room together at various Festivals. Sue's calm nature and very deep knowledge was so willingly passed on to all present. During the judging process Sue would always remind us that we MUST be positive and constructive in our comments to encourage the quilt maker to improve his/her quiltmaking skills and for them to continue to quilt and enter future competitions.

During committee meetings, Festivals and Retreats, Sue and I often shared accommodation. At these times we shared many happy times discussing our families and quiltmaking. We had such deep conversations and these I will so sadly miss. Sue was always at the end of the phone when I had something or a problem to discuss or talk to her about. She always had such words of wisdom. What a loss to us all. Sue will be so sadly missed by all of us. Her personality and her quilts will live in our hearts and minds forever.

Rest in Peace my Dear Friend - thank you for all the happy memories. She will remain in my heart forever. My prayers are with Frans, Jaqui, Judy, Nicky and their families.

Remembering JUTTA FAULDS 28 December 1933 - 12 December 2021



Jutta Hulverscheidt was born in Germany on 28 December 1933. She was an only child. Her creative journey began at a young age as she watched her mother and grandmother stitching and knitting. This became part of her daily life as she joined them in the habit of sewing and knitting whenever they could.

After attending school for ten years (in the 1950s girls in Germany were not encouraged to finish school and consider an academic future), Jutta wanted to attend Art School. Her father did not support this wish, and being an authoritarian, what he said went, and so Jutta took on an apprenticeship at Shell Oil and became an Industrial Chemist. She never resented her Father's thoughts about Art School and in retrospect feels that it was probably the best thing that could have happened to her career, as a 'box' would surely have been waiting for her to be put into. She often said that her scientific training and knowledge was in fact often extremely useful in many aspects of her creative life.

After a four year apprenticeship and qualifying as an Industrial Chemist, Jutta went to the United States of America where her Godfather had arranged a job for her in Princeton. It was here that she met Bruce Faulds who was studying towards a PHD. In 1959 they were married in the United States. They returned to Bruce's home country, South Africa, where Bruce took up a teaching post in Durban. Jutta started working at Darville Waste Water Works, where she remained until 1969, when she joined her husband on a year's sabbatical in Thunder Bay, in Ontario, Canada. This was followed by a year in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, where she joined the Campus Women's group which was run by lecturers in Architecture. They were all doing creative embroidery. Jutta was unaware that stitching could be anything more than functional, and so began her trial and error journey of exploring stitching as an art form.

In mid-1970, on her return to Pietermaritzburg, Jutta began to explore Machine embroidery. She returned briefly to Darville, but it was after her first exhibition at Art in the Park in 1970 that she began creating as a full time occupation. She first met Celia de Villiers, amongst others, at Art in the Park, as her husband was exhibiting his sculpture.

Exhibiting her pressed flower collages at Art in the Park was followed by two further exhibitions of her work at St. Saviours Church and at a craft exhibition at Robert Brusse's home in Bellaire, Durban. At this stage, Jutta was making small, hand stitched landscapes.

Jutta had a yearning to learn how to draw and joined Jane Heath for the following three years where she attended drawing classes. She made 'Hippy clothes' to finance her Art Classes and continued with making small hand stitched 'paintings'. Jutta maintained that it was Jane Heath who taught her everything, including attitude. She taught Jutta that anyone can do anything but it should be taken seriously, as success is all to do with approach and attitude. Jane Heath taught Jutta to think 'out of the box' and to 'just do it'.

During the early 1980s Jutta felt the need to make bigger art works. She started creating more fabric works and joined the Spinners and Weavers and Quilters Guilds. She was also a founding member of the Midlands Arts and Crafts Society (MACS), which was established in 1984. This was an organisation set up to assist crafters and artists who had no formal training. She made a quilted jacket for the launching exhibition in Hilton, which resulted in a comment by sculptor Henry Davies, who encouraged her to explore and push the conventional boundaries of traditional quilting.

Jutta began to make 'Wearable Art', collars and ceremonial stoles that could be worn or exhibited as wall quilts. These works were more than just functional objects, as viewers could engage with them as artworks on a visual level.

A further push to explore her creative abilities came from a fellow quilter at the first National Quilt exhibition in Durban, who asked Jutta when she was going to make a 'real quilt'. She exhibited *Izithunzi* and *The Spirit of the Oil covered Seabird* (which was influenced by the Gulf War) on the *Quilting and Beyond Exhibition* at the Tatham Art Gallery in 1993. Both of these works furthered her exploration of the possibilities of 'quilting'. Jutta stopped formally 'quilting' in 2004 when her husband Bruce was killed. She allowed her subscription to the Guild to lapse as her mind was otherwise occupied, and she never re-joined as a member of the Quilters Guild.

In 1998 Jutta went on the first of a number of trips to India with Joan Hoole. They met up with some British women who were involved in textiles, although in retrospect even though Jutta felt that this trip gave them a sanitised view of India, she admitted that it was the beginning of a new creative journey. India blew Jutta away. She returned five times subsequently, each time taking two new friends along. The creative energy and the humanity of India embraced her and made her feel like she 'belonged'. Her Teutonic roots were challenged by the serenity, the unpredictable repetition, the rhythm and the spirit of endeavour that is found on every turn as a visitor to India. Jutta felt that going back to India was more like returning home than going back to visit Germany. The Hindu philosophies of sharing and letting go and moving on became central in Jutta's life. She used and reused, and she found potential in everything and beauty in the discarded. India crept under Jutta's skin and its influence was visible in all aspects of her life.

In 2002 Jutta broke her leg. This was another turning point in her creative life as she suddenly found that not only was her mobility challenged, but her arms were busy with crutches. It was then that she discovered stitch resist dyeing. It was a slow process that could be done mostly whilst sitting down. Her exhibition *Homage to Garuda* was a result of this period of incapacity. Garuda is the Eagle God and in Hindu mythology, is a taxi for Vishnu. In Bali, Garuda is the God of creativity and he dives in and rips things apart when it is thought that someone is not working to their full potential. Jutta often suggested that her broken leg and resultant creativity was possibly Garuda's doing.

Jutta attended a workshop run by Kobie Venter in 2005. This workshop introduced her to Mandalas. Circles have always featured strongly in her work, but this workshop sent her in a new direction. Jutta began by making 'art mandalas', but they subsequently developed into her own private ponderings which she pursued on a daily basis until shortly before her death. *A Mandala a day* became Jutta's chronic medicine.

Apart from spending hours on a daily basis working in her studio, Jutta generously devoted a considerable amount of her life to the development of the Midlands Art and Crafts Society (MACS). She saw it as an environment where skills could be handed on to others - an environment that encouraged interdisciplinary creativity. She willingly taught others on a regular basis, imparting skills that she had had the good fortune of learning during her creative journey. The MACS environment allowed people who were looking for an outlet for their creativity to explore and find a way of creating – a place where they could 'just do it'.

Since the early 1970s, Jutta was well-known in Pietermaritzburg as an artist and crafter. She made a name both nationally and internationally as a Fibre artist, and continued to exhibit regularly as an individual or on group shows. One of her fibre artist colleagues referred to her as a national treasure. Jutta Faulds was a driving force in the development of Fibre Art in South Africa, and the Tatham Art Gallery is proud of an association with her that spanned more than four decades. We pay tribute to one of Pietermaritzburg's most interesting citizens and strongest creative forces, and an exceptional artist, mentor and friend.



So we enter a hopeful year.


