

# Quilts for the Festival—Important information:



<u>Red and White Quilts:</u> The Festival committee still requires about 20 more quilts which will be used on a display. These will NOT be judged and do not need to be entered onto the show. Debbie Becker needs confirmation that your quilt will be made available for the festival.

For delivery details: Please contact Debbie Becker at <u>treasurer@saquiltfest2024.co.za</u>to arrange for a collection drop off point.

<u>Love Quilts:</u> Debbie Becker has e-mailed all chairladies in KZN requesting quilts for the Love Quilt project. The details about the drop off point were emailed end of January. Chairladies who have not received the email must please make contact with Debbie via email — <u>treasurer@saquiltfest2024.co.za</u>

<u>Competition Quilts:</u> There will be NO DROP OFF POINTS for quilts entered into the Festival for judging. Quilts must be couriered to Margie Crookes—to reach her by 1 June 2024.

## Get your entered quilts Festival ready:

**Quilt Sleeve**: All quilts must have a 10cm-deep sleeve sewn to the top back of the quilt, 2cm short of either side, unless otherwise stated in a specific category (e.g. Miniatures) where specific instructions will apply. Quilts with a width of 200cm or more must have an opening of 5cm in the middle of the sleeve to facilitate the hanging of the quilt.

Cloth Label: All quilts must have a cloth label securely sewn to the back of the quilt, placed on the lower left-hand corner (viewed from the back). The label must include, in this order: the unique Quilt Entry Code and number (emailed to you once your entry has been registered), Quilt Title, Quilt-maker (s) names, Address, Phone Number, Email and Date (or Year) the quilt was made. All the information, except for the Quilt Entry Code and number and the Quilt Title, is to be covered by a piece of dark cloth, tacked onto the label. Should the quilter's name appear in any way or form anywhere else on the quilt, this also needs to be covered.

**Packaging:** Each quilt must be packaged separately in a cloth bag. No plastic bags will be accepted. Your cloth packaging must have your name on the outside, the category & quilt number.



### The Red Dress project

Conceived by British artist Kirstie Macleod, it provides an artistic platform for women around the world, many of whom are vulnerable and live in poverty, to tell their personal stories through embroidery. Initially the project sought to generate a dialogue of identity through embroidery, uniting people around the world without borders. However, over the 14 years the dress has also become a platform of self-expression and an opportunity for voices to be amplified and heard.

### **Competition Quilts**

More than 350 beautiful quilts made by local and international quilters and entered into the judged section of the Voices in Cloth Quilt Festival. Art is a universal language needing no written words to elicit human response. The artist speaks without words. Every quilt on exhibit tells a story—come and take the time to "hear" the Voices in Cloth.

### Quilt India Foundation curated "Abundance"

A collection of 58 juried quilts received in response to the annual fabric challenge organised by The Square Inch, India's first Quilt studio, based in Chennai. A bundle of nine fabrics were sent to over 100 registrants with the challenge to create a 20" x 20" art quilt representing the theme "Abundance" and with a minimum of 50% of the surface area being created with the given fabrics.

The juried-in entries reflect an "Abundance" in techniques and creativity. The serene colours, the perfect size and the unifying theme lend a sense of cohesiveness to the exhibit creating a stunning visual impact.

### Conversations we do not have

Ladies from previously disadvantaged backgrounds have embroidered a moment in time onto a piece of cloth depicting an expressive scene. This is a very special exhibition showing typical scenes in South Africa.

### **Red and White Quilts**

A collection of red and white quilts made by individuals, guilds and groups within KZN to display and enhance the Voices in Cloth Festival's red and white theme.

### 100 Voices in Cloth

Innovative video-interview enhanced exhibition showcasing the talented quilters of South Africa, curated by John Cole-Morgan.

### **IO Sunsets**

This is an exhibition from England of mini quilts made by more than 30 people to commemorate those living with cancer. Headed by John Cole-Morgan, in the name of Nicola Bretherton who sadly lost her battle with cancer far too soon.

### 12th SAQG Travelling Exhibition—A Stitch in Time

Since its conception, the South African Quilters' Guild Travelling Exhibition aims to raise awareness for the art of quilt making by showcasing the work of its members. The Travelling Exhibition quilts travel the country for up to 2 years to guilds and groups, exhibition spaces and galleries to expose quilting to other artists and the general public. According to poemanalysis.com, "a stitch in time saves nine" is an English proverb which describes the benefits of working hard now in order to save time later. It first appeared in print as an established proverb in 1732.



# Thungelimpilo (Stitch for Life) Special Exhibition

It was discovered that women in the area of Ingwavuma had a real talent for embroidery and a project was established to help generate income as so many bread winners were losing their lives. Ingwavuma has a history of supplying labour to the mining and other sectors in different parts of South Africa.

Established during the devastating AIDS epidemic of the early 2000s, the project evolved into a formal NGO and then Non Profit Company in 2014. It

was registered as Fancy Stitch.



Their evolving story, having experienced years of internalised trauma through to what they are now producing is certainly testament to the resolute nature of a group of women that could so easily have fallen into the dark holes of poverty.

As a 'community exhibitor' from KZN participating in an international exhibition, their work speaks volumes for the latent talent available in our province and is now of world class standard. Showcasing their quiet story of 'gutsing out' subjugation, poverty, COVID and lack of basic infrastructure and services while producing beautiful art is surely at the heart of every South African who cares. The grace with which they have ridden the storms of fear and the unknown has given those of us working with these remarkable women an insight into what can be achieved in our country when we just share our humanity every day.



# Showcasing: Joy Clark

As long as I'm able to, I will work towards taking part in SAQGNational and International Festivals. I am a SAQGAccreditedQuilting Teacher and I love to teach and to encourage other quilters.

Joy Clark is an artist who grew up in the world of ceramics and painting, but she also pursued sewing and dressmaking. About 42 years ago Joy's mom taught her to do patchwork. It was in the days before rotary cutters and fancy rulers. The fabric was marked with a pencil using templates and adding a ¼" line around each shape. The cutting was done with scissors and the stitching and quilting was all done by hand. Although she loved this early introduction to quilting, it only later become a big part of her life.

In 2007 Joy started teaching quilt making and has been quilting full time since 2008. She started entering her quilts in shows and competitions in 2015. In 2017 she was thrilled to complete the SAQG teacher's accreditation course and has since devoted her time to teaching. This year will be her first time teaching at a SA Festival in July at the Voices in Cloth Festival.

2017 is also the year Joy started entering quilts into a SAQG Quilt Festival and to her surprise she was named a Master Quilter. Enjoying the challenge, she has made it her mission to enter quilts in each of the SA festivals since then. She also once entered two quilts in the World Quilt Show. Joy is a member of TAPE (Textile Artists of Port Elizabeth) and remains a member of the DIAS Guild in Port Elizabeth, where she used to live. She currently lives on the KwaZulu Natal South Coast and is a member of the Hibiscus Guild and KZNQG.

Her artistic background explains Joy's preference for making art quilts, although she is well versed in traditional techniques, as is evident from her beautiful quilts that were on display at the February meeting of KZNQG. She has made many traditional and bed quilts, as well as her art quilts. A prolific seamstress, she has also made bags, cushions, jackets and hats – keen to explore and demonstrate how broadly patchwork and quilting can be applied. She loves English Paper Piecing, but her favourite thing about quilt making is the quilting itself – machine quilting, and especially free motion quilting.

As a full-time quilter, over the last three to four years, Joy has quilted close to 250 quilts for clients on her longarm machine. She enjoys free motion quilting, and finds quilting with rulers very satisfying. She



always tries to enhance the patchwork with her quilting, without dominating the pattern of the quilt top. Joy spends most days quilting (only taking a break when she teaches or has visitors over for the holidays) – often spending seven hours a day in front of her longarm machine.

Designing the quilting is not her only creative pursuit in quilt making, she can also boast that most of her quilts since 2017 have been her own designs. If she works from a pattern, she prefers those of Anna Maria Horner. She is currently also busy with two Kaffe Fassett patterns.

Joy always starts her quilts with a feature fabric and then builds on that – adding colours that are present in the feature fabric. She loves every colour except brown. She's also not fond of orange, but uses it sometimes. She combines large scale, small scale, tone on tone, geometric and floral prints to create interest.

# Showcasing: Joy Clark

I'm excitedabout our SA Quilters and grateful to SAQG for the work they do to promote and showcasequilting in SA.

Although Joy prefers to work by machine as she gets much faster results, she always has several handwork items ready to work on – for those evenings when she relaxes in front of the TV. She has always done her own quilting – initially by hand, and now mostly by machine. She loves her Bernina and "Handi Quilter" machines. Unfortunately, she currently neglects her own projects for the sake of the quilting work she does for clients, many of whom send her their quilts from other parts of the country. Piecing and applique are both enjoyable, and Joy still wants to make a whole cloth quilt but admits (like most of us) to having many UFO's waiting to be finished. She finds that it is always exciting to start something new and she likes to meet a challenge. That's why she also loves to work towards shows.



Joy's family is very supportive of her quilt making. Those who value the gift of a quilt, have received at least one from Joy. Her grandchildren have been the lucky recipients of various quilts, from cot size to bed size. As with many South Africans whose children live overseas, Joy finds quilt making a wonderful mechanism to cope with missing her children and grandchildren who currently live in Qatar, New Zealand and Australia.

Joy understands the impact of a quilt as a special memory gift. When leaving Richards Bay in 2007 her students surprised her with a quilt, and again in 2022 when she left Port Elizabeth she received a quilt made for her by the DIAS Quilting Guild members and quilted by Sue Bax. To her, these are truly wonderful gifts that she will always treasure.

# Midlands Quilting Guild THE OLDEST QUILTING GUILD IN SOUTH AFRICA Established 1981



January 2024 was handover month, where the outgoing committee welcomed the 2024 committee.

Our February meeting introduced our *Charity Quilt concept*. Funds raised this year will go to the Howick Charitable Medical Trust. Two members shared different ways to piece the "9-patch": Thelma Mylne gave advice on paper piecing and the importance of matching points; Sheena Johnson demonstrated a non-traditional technique to paper piece a nine-patch block.

Carol Hodsdon demonstrated how to turn a circle into a hexagon. A very handy alternative to create hexies without paper.

Julia Arbuckle and Jenny Dyer

We hosted *Julia Arbuckle* (artist, printmaker, lecturer at UKZN, researcher and co-founder of PMB Bookbinders Guild ) at our March meeting. Julia's multimedia approach inspired us, and suggested different ways we can approach cloth, paper, and in so doing, To find Our Voice in Cloth and Tell our Story. At our April meeting we hosted **Ira Bekker** – **botanical\_nomad** – an eco printer and dyer of natural fabric and wool. Ira has been on a ten-year journey to discover the secrets of dying cloth with plants. She wanted a sustainable method

that would not damage the environment - she finds rusty objects to make 'rust water'. Tannin-based leaves and plants

are laid on natural cloth – the cloth which is wound onto a bamboo stick and then boiled in the rust water. Ira's preference is for natural raw silk. Her cloth is sold in exclusive galleries. Jane Zietsman has arranged workshops with Ira for May, before this Nomad takes off to Ghana! (find her on Instagram: botanical\_nomad\_Ira\_Bekker).



12 mini quilts were submitted from our Guild for John Cole Morgan's 100 Voices in Cloth to be displayed at Festival.

A bumper load of *Little Quilts of Love* were handed in – a special word of thanks to the Howick Ouilters Guild who shared their quilts.

for her grandson – using motifs cut from curtain fabric appliquéd onto a painted background.

Our theme for International Quilt Day was "Something Blue" – members brought along a selection of blue stitcheries.
